



Introduction


This was a short break mainly touristy but with one wildlife target the Calabrian Black Squirrel. We flew with Jet 2 to Naples which was fine, hired a car with B Rent also fine and stayed at Agriturismo Terra Verde, nr Rotonda which was excellent. There were no early starts or late finishes.



Friday 6th October

After a very early flight we spent the day at the famous tourist sites of Herculaneum and Pompeii, we had a few incidental wildlife sightings — Italian wall lizards, red admiral, house sparrow, ring necked parakeet and a couple of very nice blue rock thrushes. The drive to Pollino National Park was uneventful.





Saturday 7th October



We explored the national park for the whole day not doing very much but kept an eye out for squirrels, one crossed the road in front of us but it vanished before I could get the camera out and we had a brief view of one high in a pine tree but again it eluded the camera. Other incidental sightings were Italian wall lizards, and Autumn Ladies Tresses.

The woods were carpeted in Cyclamen a really great sight.

We ate in the Agriturismo, a really nice traditional Italian meal before checking the moth trap, It was set next to a small wooded area by the Agriturismo, I could hear sounds in the trees and with the aid of thermal imaging they were clearly dormice not Edible dormice I know their calls, eventually I managed to spotlight one and confirm Garden Dormouse.

The moths of note were Hypsopygia glaucinalis, dotted chestnut, Agrochola nitida, Anania verbascalis, Brindled Green, Flounced Chestnut, light brocade, Mecyna asinalis, scarce bordered straw.

Sunday 8th October

We explored the high plateau south of Rotonda for most of the day, it was very picturesque, we made lots of stops and short walks. Incidental sightings were a hare sp, green woodpecker, willow tit a nice selection of butterflies, spurge hawkmoth caterpillar and a Western Green lizard.


We ate in the Agriturismo and finally had some spaghetti in what was another excellent meal.

I ran the moth trap next to the hotel, it attracted lots of field crickets and a soprano pipistrelle made plenty of visits, moths of interest were Vestal, oak hooktip, small mottled willow, mint moth, Palpita vitrealis.
