# Re-Discovery of the Grey Dwarf Hamster - 6<sup>th</sup> September 202 Romania 1st

#### Introduction

I joined this unique Saker tours trip to Romania in search of the Grey Dwarf Hamster.

This is a very rare species in the EU and in the last 70 years the only records are deceased animals or from owl pellets. But earlier in the year Zsolt had picked a suitable spot to try trapping based on historical records and caught an adult female.

I flew with Wizz Air from Luton which was not too bad and stayed in an airport hotel overnight, everything else was organised by Saker Tours. They had two leaders Zsolt Hegyeli and Janos Olah and we travelled in a 4x4



I cannot disclose the locations we visited and our hotels were quite some distance (1hr in one site) from where we trapped as the trapping locations were quite remote and without local facilities.

# Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> September

Early afternoon I was met at my airport hotel (I had arrived in the early hours) we popped to the airport to collect another participant before heading off to our first location Barlad. We checked into our hotel then headed off for some food, then headed out into the countryside for a night drive. Plenty of steppe mice, wood mice, fox, brown hare and a few bats a little owl and lots of crested larks



# Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> September

We had a leisurely breakfast during which Zsolt rang us to say he had caught something in the traps, we quickly headed off. Arriving at the trapping site Zsolt had trapped two small mammals a Lesser white toothed shrew and the prize a Grey Dwarf Hamster.

This was only the second live animal seen in the last 70 years, the first was also caught at this site earlier in the year. We took lots of photos and did the measurements, weights etc. It was a juvenile female, very nice to see. We took plenty more photos before releasing it back into the grassland.

It was incredibly hot so we headed back to town for some cold drinks. I took a walk round the town visiting the local park which had dozens of hummingbird hawk moths in the flower beds.

After an ice cream I wandered down the dried up river where there were plenty of butterflies and a wall lizard. After dinner we headed out once again for another night drive, a little owl was the only bird of note, mammal wise fox, hares, roe deer and a few mice.





# Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> September

We checked the traps first thing then collected them up, We had a look round the grassland photographing Red backed shrikes, bee eaters and the plethora of insects in the area. We had a late breakfast before heading to a new location a couple of hours further north, we based ourselves in the town of Lasi. A bit of a distance away in an area of grassland we placed our traps.

After dinner we took a night drive it was particularly productive with nightjar, badger, scops owl, fox, hare and hazel dormouse. There were quite a few bats and we got the detector out and as expected most were Nathusius pipistrelles but there was also a noctule.






## Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> September

We checked the traps first thing wood mice, bi coloured white toothed shrew, lesser white toothed shrew and common voles. A wander round the area produced red backed shrikes, hoopoe, tawny pipit and buzzard. Driving back to the hotel we found a white stork feeding in a field.

We heard that the previous night a bat worker further north had photographed a small mammal that he had encountered during a bat transect walk and it turned out to be a Grey dwarf Hamster (3rd live sighting).

An evening walk putting down more traps at a new site produced a few butterflies, Eastern green lizard and sand lizard and a little owl.

We did a night drive finding roosting quail and whinchat, northern white bellied hedgehog, steppe mouse, roe deer and possible harvest mouse located with the thermal but we could not find the actual mouse during a search.





# Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> September

Great white egrets and grey herons argued on the pools as we headed to the first set of traps which held very little, the second set were more productive and we caught a nice Ural mouse as well as wood mice, common voles and bicoloured white toothed shrews.

We collected up all the longworth traps but left the pitfalls in place for one last night.

We did an afternoon drive and walk exploring new grassland areas and it held quite a few raptors including a nice red footed falcon, Montagu's harrier, hobby, buzzard and kestrel. Other things of note were roe deer and Silver studded blue.



During dinner the rain started so we needed to collect the remaining traps, pitfall traps and rain are not a good combination. We collected all the traps then did a night drive, the rain had brought out green toads, common spadefoots and marsh frogs. We found a fox, several hares and roe deer in addition to the mice and voles and another quail was of interest.

# Friday 6<sup>th</sup> September

We took the long drive back to Bucharest, battling the heavy traffic. Only a few sightings of note during the journey white stork, buzzard, marsh harrier. My Wizz air flight was delayed 30 mins but we arrived back at Luton pretty much on time..
